

WHAT IS DIWALI?

Diwali is one of the most important events in the Indian calendar. It is celebrated by Hindus, Sikhs, Jains and Nepalese people all over the world. Diwali is also known as 'Deepavali' or 'the festival of light' which celebrates the New Year.

WHAT DOES DIWALI MEAN?


The word Diwali means 'row of lighted lamps'. Diyas are lit around homes to remember the story of Rama and Sita and good winning over evil.

Lamps are also to tempt goddess Laxmi to visit homes bringing wealth in future with her.

WHAT HAPPENS DURING DIWALI?

During Diwali, homes are cleaned and oil lamps and diya are lit. This helps guide Laxmi - the goddess of wealth and good fortune, and Ganesh - the god of wisdom, good luck and remover of obstacles into their homes for the coming year.

Gifts and sweets are shared with family and friends and prayers said to gods and goddesses at home or temples where offerings of sweets are fruit are made. Many people wear new clothes and fireworks are lit in the evening in celebration.



TRIUMPH OF GOOD VS EVIL

HINDUS - RESCUE

Rama and his wife Sita were banished to the forest for 14 years from their home in Ayodhya by the King. Ramas brother, Lakshman, also went with them.

After many hears, Ravana, a ten-headed demon, kidnapped Sita and took her away to his island of Lanka. With the help of Hanuman, the monkey god, Rama and Lakshman rescued Sita and they were all reunited.

The people of their village lit oil lamps to guide them all home and celebrated their return with fireworks and Rama was crowned Prince.

SIKHS - JUSTICE

Diwali is also celebrated by Sikhs. The 6th Guru, Guru Hargobind Sahib, was wrongly imprisoned for his beliefs by Emperor Shah Jahan. The Guru stood up for what he believed in and refused to leave the prison where he was held until the other kings and princes that were unjustly imprisoned were released too.


It was close to Diwali they were all released and therefore made the occasion and even more joyous event and expressed another triumph of good over evil.

JAINS - NIRVANA

In Jainism, they remember Lord Mahavira as this was the day he attained Moksha (nirvana). Many Gods were said to be present illuminating the darkness during this time.





Have a go at drawing your own below.





LOOK AFTER YOUR PENNIES: MAKE A PURSE



A4 template of the purse, brown foam, scissors.



1. Cut out the purse template. Remember to cut the slits both sides. Fold over the template so the slit is easier to cut.




2. Place the purse template on brown foam. Draw around it and draw the slits on through the cuts you made. Cut out the template.

1. WORKING AT THE DOCKS



CULT YOU WILL NEED: A cardboard box, the bigger the better. Scissors, tape, marker pen, pencil. Go hunting in your recycling box for paper, foil, toilet roll tubes, egg boxes, bubble wrap.



1. Draw and cut windows and door. To make it easier collapse the box to cut. Push a pencil through to make first hole then using scissors is easier. Use red paper to add some colour.



2. Make your shop a sign. Write straight on or make one on a seperate piece of cardboard. It's nice for a shop to have a sign. What will you call it?



3. To make your shelf, cut the lid from an egg box. Cut off the "spikes" sticking up from the base and tape or glue it under your window.



4. Make little turkeys, Christmas puddings and potatoes to sell from your shelf.



5. Make it snow by adding cotton wool, bubble wrap or tissue paper to your shop.

A DD LANTERNS



1. Cut a section of toilet roll tube, squash it flat one way, then the other way to make a square. Then cut out 4 sections and colour it in.



2. To make a top and bottom cut and glue a square card. Make a flame to put inside from a chocolate wrapper or tissue paper.



3. Glue or tape your lanterns to your shop. Draw in stands with a marker pen. Add a battery light if you have one.

A DD A WREATH FOR YOUR DOOR



1. Cut the rim from a mince pie or tart holder. Overlap the ends to make a circle and tape it together, making sure it is the right size for your door.



2. Cut a 15mm strip of paper, fold it in half lengthways then cut little slits all the way to make a fringe effect. Be mindful not to cut all the way through.



3. Wrap the fringe around the silver circle. Cut a bow from a scrap of paper and stick it on. Add other decoration.

2. Busk for your Christmas dinner



CULLAT YOU WILL NEED: A potato for your head. Go treasure hunting for fruit, vegetables and spices to "borrow" from the kitchen (ask for permission and say it can still be eaten afterwards).



1. For Santa use red pepper and raw onion, or similar veggies and fruit to cut into shapes. Cloves are good for faces. Use ends of tooth picks to help you keep your potato head features in place.



2. You can also create elves with smaller potatoes. Take a photo before you delicately put back for future cooking!

3. Post for a Ghost

Make a snowflake for your Christmas Pudding



CULTER YOU WILL NEED: white tissue paper, scissors, pencil. Find a small bowl to draw around.



1. Draw around your bowl to make a circle and cut it out. Fold your circle 3 times.



2. Cut triangles, semi circles and other shapes into your snowflake. To make patterns in the middle, do one extra fold in your snowflake.



3. Open it up and cut it in half. ¹/₂ for your Christmas Pudding Christmas Card (activity 3) and ¹/₂ for Deck the Halls (activity 6).

3. Post for a Ghost

Make a Christmas Pudding Christmas Card



CIFAT YOU WILL NEED: A4 Christmas pudding card to fold, pre cut shilling, ¹/₂ pre cut snowflake, brown foam, green felt, sticky tabs. A button, or a red paper circle for the cherry.



2. Cut out the pudding from brown foam and stick down on the prepared sticky tabs. You can now lift the bottom of your pudding to reveal your shilling as a secret gift. Stick half a cut out snowflake for your pudding topping.



GHOST POST


1. Place your shilling on your pudding. Cut out a gold plate and stick down with double sided tape (careful not to stick your shilling!). Put sticky tabs above your shilling.



3. Cut out two green felt holly leaves and stick these with the red button or paper to decorate the pudding. Add gold stars and some text as a message to someone for Christmas. Put in an envelope and post.

>> Could be some Winter vegetables for a Christmas dinner such as potatoes, brussel sprouts, parsnips or carrots.



3. Have you played our Parlour Game: The Smelly Memory Burglar? You can use the ingredients you found to help Cook for this game



GOU NEED:6-20 objects you can find around your house, blindfold for each player, paper and pencil for each player

How TO PLAY: Hide your objects under a tea towel. Make sure you choose some smelly ones like different foods, spices, a smelly sock... Try to find weird and wonderful smells from all around your home. Blindfold your players and allow them to sit around in a circle.

1. SMELLY

Choose smelly objects and allow your player to take a whiff. Can they guess what it is?

2. MEMORY

Put all your objects in the middle of the circle of players. Allow them to remove their blindfold for 30 seconds -1 minute. Cover the objects and then test player's memory by asking them to list everything, together as a group or individually with paper and pencil.

3.burglar

Ask players to blindfold. Take away one object. Remove blindfolds and see who is first to guess what is missing.



6. DECK THE HALLS

MAKE A CHRISTMAS PUDDING



CULLAT YOU WILL NEED: brown foam, ¹/₂ precut out snowflake, green felt, sticky tabs, ribbon, gold gems. Can you find a button, or cut out a circle of red paper, for your cherry on top?



 Cut out two circles of brown foam. Place 5 sticky tabs around one piece of foam, including 1 for the hanging ribbon and attach it. Put 2 sticky foam tabs on the front of the 2nd foam.



Stick ¹/₂ precut snowflake on the front (see
Post for a Ghost for how to make a snowflake).
Cut 2 holly leaves from the green felt and find a button, or cut a red paper circle, to stick on for your cherry. Add gold sticky gems.



3. Hang it on your tree! You earned enough to purchase your Christmas Pudding, so let's celebrate!




6. DECK THE HALLS

Make a Christmas Jurkey



WHAT YOU WILL NEED: Red, orange and brown paper, sticky tabs, ribbon, red felt, gold paper, sticky gems. A small piece of any tape or a stapler.



1. Concertina fold all the paper. Use sticky tabs to stick them together and tape or staple the tail in the middle.



2. Stick the tail together at the top, with the ribbon in place with a sticky tab. Make a turkey head and body with foam, red felt, gold paper and sticky gems. Stick it to your fan tail with sticky tabs.



3. Hang it on your tree! You earned enough to purchase your turkey, so let's celebrate!

What is Chanukah?

Chanukah is the Jewish eight-day, wintertime "festival of lights," celebrated with a nightly menorah ghting, prayers and fried foods.

In the second Century BCE, Israel was ruled by the Seleucids (Syrians and tried to force the people of Israel to accept Greek culture and beliefs. Against all odds, a small band of faithful but poorly armed Jews, led by Judah the Maccabee, defeated one of the mightiest armies on earth. They drove the Greeks from the land, reclaimed the Holy Temple in Jerusalem, and saved Jewish ethnicity, culture and religion


Pleated Chanukah Cards Project

(A step-by-step instruction guide)



Menorah card

PIECES:

DREIDEL CARD

STEP 1: Fold the top and bottom tabs.

-Start by folding the top and bottom tabs UNDERNEATH THE FRONT, so the FOLD BACK texts are visible when you turn the paper backside up. Use the _____ marks to help you.

STEP 2: Pleat the card front

-Fold the tab labelled 'Centre Spine' UNDERNEATH THE FRONT, along the line where the image begins, so that the CENTRE SPINE text is visible when you turn the paper backside up.

-Begin folding **along the lines where the colour strips meet the black and white strips**, folding up and down as if making a paper fan. Use the guide marks on the blank side of the artwork to help make the folds on the back. It is important that the folds hit these lines.

-When you make your last fold between the final black and white strip and the empty strip, the empty strip should be folded down to face the back (just like the CENTRE SPINE tab.)

STEP 3: Pleat the card back

-Repeat Steps 1 and 2 for pleating the card back, so you end up with two separate pleated pieces.

STEP 4: Glue the centre spines together

-Carefully glue both CENTRE SPINE tabs together with Pritt glue or white craft glue. The outer shell of the card is now finished.


STEP 5: Fold over, or cut off the top and bottom tabs on the lining piece along the dashed line. Fold the piece in half inwards along the centre spine.

STEP 6: Write your holiday message to your friends and family (on the lining piece!)

-Leave a little bit of space on the right and left edges of the card, about two fingers' width.

STEP 7: Glue the outer shells to the card lining to finish your card!

-Place the lining piece in front of the pleated outer shell so that the centre spines line up. Tuck the folded blank edges of the pleated outer piece over the clean edges of the lining piece. Carefully glue the folded outer edges to the lining. Repeat process for Menorah card.





