International and homegrown programme includes visionary South Korean opera adaptation of Shakespeare's *King Lear*

The Barbican today announces its upcoming programme of Theatre and Dance productions from 19 September 2024 to 18 January 2025, including the London premieres of the **Royal Shakespeare Company**'s **The Buddha of Suburbia** (co-produced with Wise Children) and **A Midsummer Night's Dream**. Known for its spectacular and experimental programme of contemporary live performance, the Barbican's line-up features international and UK-based artists and includes UK premieres from South Korea and France; in association with longtime collaborators Dance Umbrella festival, a UK premiere from South Africa and a new work in The Pit; a curated takeover in The Pit celebrating new work by disabled artists; and the world premiere for this year's winner of the Oxford Samuel Beckett Theatre Trust Award.

Tickets for the Barbican season go on sale to <u>Barbican Patrons</u> today, Tue 11 June; to Barbican Members Plus on Wed 12 June; Barbican Members on Thu 13 June; and on general sale on Fri 14 June via <u>barbican.org.uk</u>. Tickets for *The Buddha of Suburbia* and *A Midsummer Night's Dream* go on sale to Barbican Patrons on Mon 24 June, Barbican Members plus on Thu 27 June, Barbican

Members on Wed 3 July and on general sale on Tue 9 July via barbican.org.uk.

The season begins on the main stage in the Barbican Theatre, as **Clod Ensemble** and **Nu Civilisation Orchestra** transform the venue into a vibrant cabaret bar. In their acclaimed production **The Black Saint and The Sinner Lady**, audiences will join the award-winning dancers and musicians onstage as they bring to life Charles Mingus' 1963 big band masterpiece.

Next up is another multi-disciplinary work featuring live music, film, and a multi-lingual cast of international actors and musicians. From one of France's most prestigious national organisations, La Colline - théâtre national, comes the UK premiere of *House*, a large-scale stage adaptation of Amos Gitaï's groundbreaking documentary trilogy which creates a dialogue between an ensemble of actors and musicians from France, Iran, Israel, Palestine, and the UK. Complementing the production, Barbican Cinema will screen the original documentary films made by Gitai in 1980, 1998 and 2006. Presented alongside the verbatim stage adaptation, these works enable insights into some of the complexities of the narratives of Palestinians and Israelis, voicing multiple experiences and perspectives.

National Changgeuk Company of Korea makes their Barbican debut with the international premiere of *Lear*, following their acclaimed adaptation of *Trojan Women* with a major restaging of Shakespeare's greatest tragedy, explored through Changgeuk. The prestigious company has been leading a great resurgence of this traditional Korean opera style for contemporary audiences in recent years, personified in *Lear* which incorporates classic stories, ancient philosophy, Korean language and spectacular staging to explore the nature of our existence.

Opening this year's **Dance Umbrella** Festival is the UK premiere of choreographer and director **Mamela Nyamza**'s *HATCHED ENSEMBLE*, an urgent and subtly spectacular work that challenges ballet's traditions. Accompanied by a live multi-instrumentalist, ten ballet dancers from across South Africa subvert gender roles and interrogate accepted norms of the classical form. This piece is an extension of the acclaimed autobiographical solo work, *HATCHED*, which featured in Dance Umbrella's 2011 festival and first introduced UK audiences to her socio-political work. The festival continues in The Pit, with a first look at visual artist **Hetain Patel**'s new show, *Mathroo Basha*. Translated here as Mother Tongue, Patel will explore generational change across his British-Gujarati heritage through movement and audio interviews.

Also in The Pit will be a world premiere by this year's winner of the **Oxford Samuel Beckett Theatre Trust Award**, **Finn Beames & Company**. **Quiet Songs** is a semi-autobiographical, coming-of-age tale which explores the limits of a breaking voice for an actor, string quartet and an armoury of swords. Then **CRIPtic Arts** returns with **The Acts**, a searingly honest piece of meta-theatre bringing together performances from four of the UK's most exciting disabled theatre makers and companies, directed by **Jamie Hale**. And leading us into festive season, **First Light** returns after 2021's sold out run to delight Barbican's youngest audiences and their families. The experience introduces babies to an interactive sensory environment and was co-created by theatre-maker **Daniel Naddafy** and artist & lighting designer **Marty Langthorne**.

Toni Racklin, Head of Theatre & Dance at the Barbican, said:

"We are delighted to contribute to the Barbican's extensive offer as an international multi-arts centre with our upcoming season, as we fill our glorious main stage with transformative and epic productions and celebrate the work of daring theatremakers in The Pit.

Continuing our mission to craft a programme of experiences that connect our audiences with life beyond our shores, once again we welcome the most exciting artists who are creating breathtaking live performances from all over the world; through awe-inspiring opera and a bustling jazz club; with verbatim theatre and at the cutting edge of contemporary dance. This year we have filled our eclectic programme with shows that revisit familiar stories from new perspectives through adaptations of classics, films, a seminal album, and a best-selling novel. A strong pulse of evocative live music will also flow throughout the season, beginning with a full jazz orchestra and featuring instruments and song from Korea, Middle East and South Africa.

In our experimental studio, The Pit, Hetain Patel and Finn Beames & Company will make their Barbican debuts with brand new work, and we welcome the return of CRIPtic Arts. Closing the year, First Light's wonderous sensory experience for babies who are making their very first visit to the Barbican."

Throughout the Barbican Centre, further programme highlights taking place this year include:

In June, the Barbican will host a number of events during <u>SAFAR Film Festival</u> (21–30 June), the UK's largest Arab film festival, including a ScreenTalk preview of *Bye Bye Tiberias*, attended by award-winning filmmaker Lina Soualem, who celebrates her Palestinian family history. The festival closes at the Barbican with Amr Gamal's *The Burdened*, which offers a rare glimpse into the everyday realities of Yemeni families, dealing with the fallout of economic collapse and war.

In the unique Sculpture Court, Barbican's inimitable <u>Outdoor Cinema</u> programme returns (21 Aug-1 Sep). Barbican cinema curators have created an outdoor programme like no other, inspired by the sweeping vision of some of cinema's most original storytellers, among them Wes Anderson (*The Grand Budapest Hotel*), Sofia Coppola (*Marie Antoinette*), Vincente Minnelli (*An American In Paris*), Kamal Amrohi (*Pakeesah*), Michel Gondry (*Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind*), Dee Rees (*Pariah*), Hayao Miyazaki (*The Boy and the Heron*), Yoshimitu Banno (*Godzilla Vs. Hedorah*) and Ingmar Bergman (*Wild Strawberries*), alongside the work of two of music's most inventive artists, Prince (*Sign O' the Times*) and Björk (*Björk, Biophilia*).

This autumn, the Barbican will present a trio of new music theatre pieces in the Concert Hall variously combining Sufi, Ghanaian, Chinese, Indian and Western classical traditions while challenging hierarchical structures and examining where power imbalances can affect change. Presented by UK company Mahogany Opera, *Sky in a Small Cage* (8 Sep), explores the extraordinary life of the Sufi poet Rumi through music by Rolf Hind, words by Dante Micheaux, and translations of Rumi's own poetry. Composer Gorges Ocloo's acclaimed 'Afropera' project, *The Golden Stool, or the story of Nana Yaa Asantewaa* (14 Oct), pays homage to the heroic woman who confronted colonial injustice in 1900 Ghana, reimagining western classical works through a Ghanaian lens. Presented alongside the BBC Symphony Orchestra, *M. Butterfly* (25 Oct), is a semi-staged version of Huang Ruo's opera of David Henry Hwang's smash-hit play. This gripping production reveals the blurred lines between fantasy and reality at the heart of this true story of ambiguity, illusion, fluidity and metaphor.

From October, the Barbican Art Gallery presents the world's first major exhibition of Indian art. <u>The Imaginary Institution of India: Art 1975 – 1998</u> (5 Oct – 5 Jan) will explore and chart a period of significant cultural and political change in the country. This groundbreaking group show will feature over 25 artists and nearly 150 works from across a range of media, including many that will be shown in the UK for the first time. There will also be a dedicated cinema programme, specially curated to accompany the exhibition.

Celebrate the sensuality and power of jazz as **Clod Ensemble** and **Nu Civilisation Orchestra** present a new perspective on American bassist and composer Charles Mingus' iconic 1963 recording of *The Black Saint and the Sinner Lady*, widely considered to be one of the greatest albums of all time. Following the acclaimed 2023 performances at Shoreditch Town Hall as part of EFG London Jazz Festival, the award-winning companies will now transform the Barbican Theatre's stage into a vibrant jazz club for the first time.

Clod Ensemble's dancers will bring Mingus' music to life, delivering dense-knit choreography and passages of improvisation which honour his vision for dance to accompany his provocative masterpiece. Shows will feature new compositions from Clod Ensemble's Artistic Director Paul Clark, Nu Civilisation Orchestra musical director Peter Edwards, and drummer/composer Romarna Campbell. The live orchestra and dynamic dancers perform amongst audiences, who can join them on the dancefloor or take a backseat while soaking up the atmosphere.

Since 1995, Clod Ensemble's Suzy Wilson and Paul Clark have developed a highly original performance language, blending movement, dance, music and theatre. Their ambitious and finely crafted performance and participation projects have been delivered at renowned venues across the world (Tate Modern, Southbank Centre, Public Theater New York, Venice Architecture Biennale, Serralves Museum Porto) to critical acclaim; including the iconic *Red Ladies* and the visually stunning *Under Glass* (Total Theatre Award Winner).

Formed in 2008 by Artistic Director, and Co-Founder of Tomorrow's Warriors, Gary Crosby OBE and led by musical director Peter Edwards, Nu Civilisation Orchestra is a shapeshifting, cutting edge ensemble. NCO has toured and performed extensively across the UK and highlights include their BBC Proms debut (2019), and a 50th anniversary national tour of Marvin Gaye's masterpiece, *What's Going On* (2021). The Orchestra returns to the Barbican Centre following a performance with Brazilian legend Arthur Verocai in the Barbican Hall, 28 June 2024.

La Colline - théâtre national: House

La Colline – théâtre national in Paris, one of Europe's most important cultural institutions, revisits a groundbreaking documentary trilogy by filmmaker **Amos Gitai** with a large-scale, international theatre production.

House tells the story of a West Jerusalem home through autobiographical accounts of its successive inhabitants, Palestinians and Israelis. The stage production is based on Gitai's *House* trilogy, documentaries filmed over a span of more than 25 years (1980, 1998, 2006). The first film, *House* (1980), was originally commissioned by Israeli television and subsequently banned. The Barbican will present the UK premiere of the stage adaptation alongside screenings of the original trilogy in the Barbican Cinemas (25-28 Sep).

This latest production of *House* is a dialogue between an ensemble of actors and musicians from France, Iran, Israel, Palestine, Germany, and the UK. They speak and sing in Arabic, English, French, Hebrew, and Yiddish. *House* is an attempt to discuss the present and future whilst paying mind to the past.

Amos Gitai is an award-winning director, visual artist and theatremaker, based in Haifa and Paris, internationally known for his documentaries and feature films which have focused on Israel-Palestine Israeli society past and present, and the lives of the different communities in the Middle Eastern region. He has adapted several of his films for the stage, including A Letter to a Friend in Gaza and Yitzhak Rabin: Chronicle of an Assassination (Coronet Theatre).

Cinema Screenings

Complementing the staging of House in the Barbican Theatre, the Barbican Cinema presents Amos

Gitai's <u>House trilogy</u> - an archaeological excavation of the multiple narratives which cross ways under the same roof of a West Jerusalem house - in a three-part programme of the documentaries made in 1980, 1998 and 2006.

Personal stories of displacement, occupation, migration and the longing for home make Gitai's ground-breaking trilogy a fascinating and poignant account of memory, identity and the long-lasting impact of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict on people's lives and livelihoods.

House + ScreenTalk with Film Director Amos Gitaï (12A*) Israel 1980, Amos Gitai, 60 min Wed 25 Sep, 6:30pm Cinema 2

House, the director's debut full-length documentary, made over 40 years ago and originally commissioned by Israeli television and subsequently banned, chronicles the story of a house in West-Jerusalem: firstly owned by a Palestinian Doctor who was forced to leave during the 1948 war; appropriated by the Israeli government as "vacant'; rented to Jewish Algerian immigrants in 1956; and then purchased by an Israeli university professor who turned it into an affluent multi story property.

House is both a literal and a metaphorical manifestation of the multiple narratives at the heart of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, existing under the same "roof" and a depiction of the way they have been embodied in the life of the multiple residents of a single Jerusalem house.

Fifteen years after filming *House*, Amos Gitai returns to the setting of his first film to observe the changes in the new residents as well as in the neighbourhood. *A House in Jerusalem* is a portrait not just of a street, but of a city and a country. Here, Gitai works like an archaeologist, revealing, under multiple layers, a complex labyrinth of destinies through interviews with the current residents of a well-to-do neighbourhood in West Jerusalem, the Palestinian family who lived there in the past, an archaeologist and more.

The West Jerusalem building, the main "character" of the previous documentaries in Gitai's trilogy, is no longer the microcosm it once was 25 years ago. While its inhabitants dispersed and this common space has disintegrated, it remains both an emotional and physical centre at heart of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. With *News from Home, News from House*, Amos Gitai completes the trilogy which began with 1980's *House* and continued in 1998's *A House in Jerusalem*. Forming a sort of human archaeology, exploring the relationships between the house's inhabitants, past and present, between Israelis and Palestinians.

National Changgeuk Company of Korea: Lear

National Changgeuk Company of Korea make their Barbican debut with the international premiere of *Lear*, a visionary restaging of one of Shakespeare's greatest tragedies into a spellbinding traditional Korean opera. This major new production, critically acclaimed at its premiere in Korea's National Theater in 2022, retells a familiar story in the form of Changgeuk. The culturally significant

and artistically rich theatrical form in Korea blends music, dance, and drama to create immersive storytelling experiences rooted in Korean tradition and heritage combined with creative contemporary influences. *Lear* will open the 2024 K-Music Festival.

Lear is helmed by some of the country's leading creatives, performers and musicians including one of the greatest playwrights of Korea, **Pai Sam-shik** (*Trojan Women*), direction and choreography by **Jung Young-doo**, Pansori (traditional Korean folk opera) scores composed by **Han Seung-seok**, with additional music written by K-Pop producer **Jung Jae-il** (*Parasite, Squid Game*). The stunning set design by **Lee Tae-sup** brings a quiet but vibrant world of water on stage, drawing us to the deep, bottomless abyss of the human mind.

National Changgeuk Company of Korea is one of the resident companies of the National Theater of Korea and it has been presenting traditional Korean opera for the past six decades. Since 2012, the company has explored wider possibilities within the genre, adopting contemporary themes, collaborating with international artists and reaching a global audience for the first time. The company made their UK premiere with their acclaimed restaging of Euripides' *Trojan Women* (LIFT 2018; Edinburgh International Festival 2023). *Lear* is part of the UK-wide K-Music Festival 2024, showcasing contemporary Korean music based on traditions.

In association with Dance Umbrella, the Barbican presents the UK premiere of choreographer **Mamela Nyamza**'s **HATCHED ENSEMBLE**, a subtly spectacular work featuring ten dancers, an opera singer and an African traditional multi-instrumentalist.

Clad in stunning costume creations, the dancers challenge gender norms whilst juxtaposing references to Western classical dance and music with South African vocals. *HATCHED ENSEMBLE* is the extension of Nyamza's original and highly acclaimed solo work *HATCHED*, created in 2007, an autobiographical work where the choreographer reflected on her life as a mother, lesbian and artist.

Mamela Nyamza is a dancer, choreographer, director, and performing artist who has been trained in ballet, modern and African dance styles. She has won many accolades for her activism-focused creations. *HATCHED ENSEMBLE* continues her work which unapologetically demystifies and deconstructs the history of dance, interrogating the accepted norms of the classics.

Dance Umbrella Hetain Patel: Mathroo Basha

The Barbican in association with Dance Umbrella present two performances of acclaimed visual artist and award-winning filmmaker **Hetain Patel**'s latest commissioned work. This will be the first opportunity to see *Mathroo Basha* (Mother Tongue in Gujarati), which uses movement and audio interviews with family to explore generational change across his Brit-Gujarati heritage.

Following the passing of a number of first-generation immigrants in his family, British born Patel reflects on what is lost and what is transformed, revisiting rituals rooted in his family's working-class Brit-Gujarati experience.

Responding physically to audio interviews of women from his family speaking in Gujarati and English about inheritance, loss and the future, *Mathroo Basha* delves into the emotional realities of generational change through personal movement explorations where his body becomes the conduit.

London-based artist Hetain Patel has shown films, paintings, sculptures, photographs and performance work across the world, in galleries, theatres and iconic outdoor spaces. Patel's stage work explores identity and freedom, blending choreography, text, and popular culture in acclaimed solo works including *American Boy* and *American Man*, and *Let's Talk About Dis* (commissioned by Candoco Dance Company). Patel was awarded the prestigious Film London Jarman prize in 2019 for his video art (including works such as *Don't Look at the Finger* and *The Jump*), while his video and performance works online have been watched over 50 million times, including his 2013 TED talk *Who Am I? Think Again*.

Finn Beames & Company: Quiet Songs

Quiet Songs, a piece of music theatre for a single actor, a string quartet and an armoury of swords, receives its world premiere in The Pit this autumn. Sounding out the hidden depths of a human voice, the new show creates a beautifully unsettling world where string instruments are played with swords. The debut work by **Finn Beames & Company** is the winner of the 2024 Oxford Samuel Theatre Trust Award.

A bullied teenager feels their voice breaking. Can it ever be fixed? In this coming-of-age tale about a young gay person seeking identity in an unkind world, musicians and their instruments become the storytellers.

Written, composed and directed by Finn Beames, in close collaboration with an actor and string quartet, *Quiet Songs* is a semi-autobiographical, unflinching portrait of adolescence. Told through a transfixing fusion of words, live music and meticulous staging, it follows what happens to a voice when it is cruelly pushed to breaking point, and how self-expression can be found beyond that.

Finn Beames & Company is a changing group of collaborators making music-led work for live performance. Founder Finn Beames is a theatre maker whose practice combines text, music and staging. His stage work includes current project *Heavenly Bodies* (commissioned by Audrey Productions, supported by Bristol Old Vic) and *Man: 3 Plays by Tennessee Williams* (Genesis Future Directors Award, Young Vic). He is also founder and leader of the Aphasia New Music Group, a cocreative music project delivered with UCL's Communication Clinic which has mounted two London performances and a national tour to date.

CRIPtic Arts returns to the Barbican by popular demand, following sold-out Pit Party takeovers in 2019 and 2021. *The Acts*, directed by CRIPtic's Artistic Director **Jamie Hale**, is a searingly honest, bold, and gripping piece of meta-theatre, bringing together performances from four of the UK's most exciting disabled theatre makers and companies.

Inside the walls of a bustling theatre, four acts are hard at work on their latest productions: **A.C.**Smith writes a letter to her daughter in *To Rose On Her 18th Birthday*, a solo show about love, joy and cancer; Stephen Bailey and ASYLUM Arts' dark comedy *Autistic as Fuck* explores the ways neurodivergent people are expected to sell their stories for the stage; Peyvand Sadeghian and

Matthew Robinson use immersive projections & material from the NASA archives to create a multisensory meditation on isolation and moon landings in *Over the Moon*; and **Rachel Gadsden** and **Freddie Meyers** bring a dynamic "live" art and sound performance, *PostHuman*, that navigates the audience through a journey of PostHuman ideology.

CRIPtic Arts is creating an artistic landscape where disabled people flourish. CRIPtic brings the most exciting disabled creatives to stages around the UK, producing work that is urgent: bold, feisty, vulnerable and darkly comedic. Founded in 2019 as a disabled-led organisation by award-winning performer and director Jamie Hale, CRIPtic is at the forefront of the disability arts sector, developing emerging and established creatives, staging exceptional work, and embedding access into the heart of the arts.

Daniel Naddafy / Marty Langthorne: First Light

Co-created by theatre-maker **Daniel Naddafy**, and artist & lighting designer **Marty Langthorne**, *First Light* returns to the Barbican following the success of its debut sold-out run in 2021. The immersive, intimate experience explores the wonders of our sensory development in early childhood and has been specially produced to be an engaging, calming and relaxing first theatre visit for babies.

Inspired by the University of Sussex's 'baby lab' research, this 15-minute installation for one or two babies at a time, distils the world of awakening perception into a captivating show. Babies up to 18 months-old, along with their grown-ups, are invited to sit, lie-down or stand-up as they bathe in sound and light. The specially created soundscape of domestic and everyday sounds harmonise with and echo the progression of a newborn's hearing.

Daniel Naddafy is a theatre maker and performer based in London who creates work for young audiences including *Glisten*, his acclaimed solo performance for babies. Naddafy has developed work with the National Theatre, Royal Shakespeare Company, National Theatre of Korea, Stratford Circus and Kali Theatre, and has performed in venues across the UK and internationally in Japan, South Korea, Hong Kong and Singapore. Since 2021 he has been an active member of Polka Theatres Artistic Working Group. He is a lead artist with Playground, a Kent-based participatory arts project.

Marty Langthorne is a London-based artist and lighting designer. His work encompasses live art, theatre, performance, dance and fine art and has extensively toured the UK and internationally. He has worked with companies including National Theatre Wales, Candoco, Scottee, Bryony Kimmings, and Figs in Wigs.
