

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Reviving the tale of a forgotten heroine

An innovative new 'AfrOpera' brings Bizet, Handel, Aretha Franklin and Lady Gaga together with African rhythms to explore an inspiring story of female resistance.



At the start of the 20th century, Nana Yaa Asantewaa – queen mother of the Asante people in what is now Ghana – led her people's war against the British Empire. The colonisers were slaughtering the Asante to gain access to their natural resources, such as timber, gold and cocoa.

However, as the tide of war began to turn, and the Asante were about to lose, the British demanded they hand over the Golden Stool – the symbol of the nation's power for hundreds of years. But Yaa Asantewaa replaced it with a fake one, so the British could never morally win over the Asante.

This is the starting point for a powerful and innovative work by multidisciplinary artist Gorges Ocloo: The Golden Stool, or the story of Nana Yaa Asantewaa.

'When I was growing up in Ghana, Nana Yaa Asantewaa was a true goddess,' he says. 'She was highly respected for what she had done for the Asante people during the war and was even pictured on their currency.

'When I went back in 2022 to do my research for The Golden Stool, or the story of Nana Yaa, I was very disappointed to see there was no respect left for her legacy. I envisioned doing a piece about her life, spanning from her birth to her death, but noticing how forgotten she was, I re-shaped the idea. It became a work about brave women throughout history, women speaking their minds and standing up for themselves. As it says in the piece, "Brave women are always forgotten. Murderous men are remembered." My work always carries a strong, often political message - a reason to bring something to the stage, a story that needs to be told.

Known for his multidisciplinary approach, Ocloo uses music, contemporary dance, performance art, visual arts and scenography in his theatre and dance productions. For *The Golden Stool*, the staging is minimal, set in the Sahara, with the floor used as a huge percussive element – triggered by the dancing, stomping and movements of the ten women on stage. 'The energy flows non-stop throughout the piece, from beginning to end,' says Ocloo, who is artist in residence at the renowned LOD Musiktheater in Belgium.

He describes the production as 'a musical confrontation between Europe and Africa, injecting twelve classical Western opera songs with highly rhythmic percussion. It's what I call "AfrOpera". I play a game with the appropriation of cultural symbols, like the English did with the Golden Stool. I don't steal the music; I just borrow it for a while.'

Soprano Nobulumko Mngxekeza-Nziramasanga and mezzo-soprano Nonkululeko Nkwinti are joined by eight other women on stage for this mesmerising work.

'Eight out of the ten singers on stage didn't have anything to do with classical music, but they started singing this medley of different feminist songs during lunch break – strong women from their own time – so I decided to bring that into the piece,' says Ocloo. 'It becomes a blend of strong female voices from all ages. In this scene, it's about the women on stage, about who they are, and not their characters. It's them saying: "This is enough".

The result is a powerful energy that thunders from the stage. 'What [the performers] are doing for almost two hours – singing, dancing, acting – amazes me. None of these women knew each other before, but within days, they connected with each other to become this unified group and started feeling what I wanted to tell on stage.

'The piece is not mine any more; it's theirs now.'

Madama Butterfly transformed

Chinese-born composer Huang Ruo's M. Butterfly takes David Henry Hwang's Broadway hit back to its roots in Puccini's famous 20th-century work, Madama Butterfly. However, this innovative new opera reworks the original to empower Asian characters instead of Westerners, while the sexist tropes in the opera are addressed through gender fluidity.

Experience the familiar themes of love, betrayal and self-deception from a new perspective in this UK premiere by the BBC Symphony Orchestra with BBC Singers, under the baton of Taiwan's Carolyn Kuan.

'The big picture is this kind of imbalance between East and West, and the smaller picture is the interplay of male and female, and Asians being treated as subhuman. That is entirely reversed in *M. Butterfly*,' Ruo told the New York Times.

The composer is renowned for using innovative elements in his works: sound installation, experimental improvisation, and a filmic sensibility.

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A journey through herstory

Travel the world through music by under-represented composers in pianist Samantha Ege's latest project.

Exchange, empowerment and sisterhood are the key themes in *Her Stories* – Samantha Ege's potent new work inspired by musical salons in 1930s and 40s Chicago that saw performances by composers such as Florence Price and Margaret Bonds.

Ege says Her Stories was inspired by her first book, South Side Impresarios: How Race Women Transformed Chicago's Classical Music Scene (which will be published in November). The journey starts in Chicago but broadens out to become an investigation of music from around the world. 'The programme takes the audience on a journey through Price's Chicago to various folk tales and sounds from Cuba, China and Mexico,' she explains.

Discover works by Cuban-American Odaline de la Martinez, Havana-born Camila Cortina Bello, Mexican composer Gabriela Ortiz, and Chinese-American Chen Yi, as the serial champion of the underrepresented takes us on a journey across the planet.

[']I have been thinking a lot about this idea of "American" music, which I focus on as a music historian,' says Ege. 'But really, my focus




has, for the most part, been the USA. So, as a pianist, I felt inspired to explore the area of American music more broadly.'

It's a tantalising prospect from the multitalented musician and author. 'Writing is my passion,' says Ege, 'but playing the piano is my superpower. It allows me to do things that simply aren't possible as a writer: I can express myself in more profound ways, I can reach wider audiences, and I can make new histories.'

Camila Cortina Bello's Bravura has a 'Florence Price' theme and a 'Margaret Bonds' theme, which Ege will demonstrate as part of the concert. 'It's so clever how she introduces them, entwines them, and also gives us these gorgeous Afro-Cuban rhythms to enjoy throughout,' she says. 'It's the perfect segue to Odaline de la Martinez's Studies in Rhythm, which similarly draws from her Cuban heritage. Both pieces are world premieres and special commissions for Her Stories, which is very exciting.'

The enduring influence of mystic poet Rumi

Composer Rolf Hind tells us that the works of Sufi poet Rumi remain powerfully resonant centuries after he wrote them.

Journey back in time to the 13-century Seljuk Empire and discover the story of Rumi, a legendary figure in Sufism – a mystical Islamic belief – through composer Rolf Hind's new opera, *Sky In A Small* Cage.

'It's a hybrid of a Passion (in the Christian sense), an opera and a series of tableaux developed from the life and poetry of the Sufi mystic Rumi,' explains Hind, who has combined excerpts from Rumi's poetry in translation with words by contemporary poet Dante Micheaux to create a powerful piece. 'In a similar way, my music usually falls somewhere between Western contemporary music sound and techniques, and traditions and instruments from various points of the compass which I use regularly: qawwali, Turkish scales and gamelan, for example. Here, this creates an imagined musical world for the Seljuk Empire of the 13th century – where Rumi lived – a place and sound beyond time and identity where this passionate, beautiful poetry speaks to and for all of us.'

Narrator Elaine Mitchener leads a cast that includes countertenor James Hall and bass-baritone-dancer Yannis François, who will portray the intense spiritual relationship between Rumi and his guide and soulmate, Shams. The opera will be performed for the first time in the UK here in September.

Hind has been fascinated by Rumi since encountering his writing on a silent retreat. 'Five days into the silence, the teacher read one of his poems, which detonated in my consciousness like a bomb. I became an avid reader and fan, visited his birthplace in Konya and read widely about him.

'The piece started as a way of expressing the poetry in music and then, in discussions with [opera and contemporary music theatre producer and director] Freddie Wake-Walker, as a dramatic vehicle to express that wonder and the vital message of love, passion, unity and tolerance in our wayward world.'

Although he lived in the 13th century, Rumi's work has resonated through the ages. 'The poetry of Rumi was the starting point, and the original plan was a piece that only set his poetry, but then we brought on board Dante Micheaux, whose wonderful text also illuminates some of the psychological stories of Rumi's life, suffering, and joy,' says Hind. 'The music, movement and scenography explore the potency of Sufi thought and mysticism – its arcana, mystery and rapt sense of wonder, and its dance, so the audience is free to resonate with the sounds, the visuals and the poetry on their own personal path.'

From the 12th century to the 21st

Hildegard von Bingen was a German abbess and mystic whose visions and studies culminated in a series of plays, hymns, antiphons and monophony that constitute some of the best-known works of the 12thcentury spiritual movement.

Now, there's a chance to hear her renowned compositions in a new multidisciplinary way, as Voice Trio shares these early music classics with a technological spin. Hildegard Transfigured sees the group – famed for their performances of the composer's music – bring a mix of ancient and modern to LSO St Luke's. The polymath's works will be sung by the trio, while artist Innerstrings applies 60s-style visuals and sound-reactive elaboration to mimic the intense visions Hildegard experienced, which she called 'the living light'.

The programme also includes cellist and composer Laura Moody's various works from Hildegard Portraits, and Tim Lea Young's Three Wings, Part 1.





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
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
